UNTIL 31ST AUGUST 2014

ANCIENT WISDOM

Find out what the ancients did for us. Shoot down a castle wall with a Roman catapult and see how the Egyptians locked their doors. Build an aqueduct to guide water to a village and try the Greek way of using the Sun to burn the enemy's ships. There is art and music as well, and you can even write your name in hieroglyphics.

HAVE FUN LEARNING ABOUT ANCIENT DISCOVERIES!

Make a Mosaic

Use small marble and stone tiles to create your own design.

Archimedes Screw

Turn a handle to watch balls travel up the screw.

Catapult

Build a castle wall and fire balls with a catapult to knock it down.

Aqueduct

Place channels and pillars to build an aqueduct to channel water.

Roman Arch

Build a Roman arch and see how strong it is.

Ancient Translation

Write your name in hieroglyphics and use a clay tablet.

Grinding Wheel

Assemble cogs on a magnetic table to turn the grindstone.

Word Spinner

Make up entirely new words from Greek and Roman roots, or understand the origin of familiar words.

South Pointing Chariot

Wheel the chariot around the gallery and work out how the man always points south.

Signalling

Communicate with your friend using flags, as the Romans did.

Archimedes Mirrors

Position three mirrors to concentrate the 'sunlight' onto a ship and watch how quickly the temperature rises.

Mechanical Locks

Try opening an Egyptian and a Roman lock.

Musical Scales

Pluck a guitar string in the correct places worked out by Pythagoras and play harmonious chords.

Hero's five Simple Machines

Experiment with the lever, wheel, screw, pulley and wedge. These were the only machines ancient builders had to help them lift heavy weights.

There will also be the chance to see some ancient Greek and Egyptian artefacts provided by National Museums Liverpool. Discover more about the Romans in Shropshire in our Roman Gallery.

Ancient Wisdom is displayed on the Balcony.

‘Living Dangerously’

Terry Spencer was Biggles and James Bond wrapped up in one real-life man. A highly decorated Spitfire pilot during World War Two, he later became an award-winning and indomitable photo-journalist for LIFE Magazine, working from his base in South Africa where he had moved after the war.

He married English actress Lesley Brook who endured 15 years on an isolated farm near Johannesburg, where she brought up their children. They returned to England in the early 1960s, just in time for Terry to cover the ‘Swinging Sixties’. He photographed The Beatles, travelling with them all over England and Europe in the early days of their fame as well as other rock and film stars and world leaders. He also photographed on movie sets such as ‘The Battle of Britain’, ‘Chitty Chitty Bang Bang’, ‘On Her Majesty’s Secret Service’ and ‘Ryan’s Daughter’.

Terry spent several months covering the Vietnam War, as well as the Six Day Arab-Israeli War and the Radfan campaign in Aden. Nothing however compared to the atrocities witnessed in the Congo. Terry loathed violence of any kind and wouldn’t even watch a cowboy film.

Terry and Lesley died within 24 hours of each other in 2009. He left his remarkable photo archive of over one million negatives to his eldest daughter, Cara. They wrote a joint autobiography called ‘Living Dangerously’.

Cara now lives near Shrewsbury and has generously allowed the cream of her father’s photographs to be exhibited during the summer holidays in the Special Exhibitions Gallery.

Award-winning photographer Jill Furmanovsky of Rockarchive is supporting the exhibition by contributing prints from the World’s largest collective of rock photographers. Jill was the official photographer of Pink Floyd. Many of Rockarchive’s prints displayed in Shrewsbury have recently been on show at London’s Royal Albert Hall in an exhibition called ‘50 Years of British Rock History.’

Exposed: The Body in Art from Dürer to Freud

A selection of works by artists such as Rodin, Bacon and Rosetti reveals a range of different responses to the human body.

The exhibition is centred around Burne-Jones' 1878 Pygmalion series, which is used to set out five themes for exploration. As well as looking at how the body has been a focus of artistic observation throughout history, the display picks out examples that depict visions of an 'ideal body', mutations of the body and how the body has been used as a vehicle for imagination and fantasy.

Other notable artists whose works are featured include Albrecht Dürer, Barbara Hepworth, Helen Chadwick and Lucian Freud.

Exposed is a touring exhibition from Birmingham Museums Trust supported by Arts Council England.

Re:Collect Artists Exhibition - Curiosity

Local Contemporary Artist Group, Re:Collect formed during a professional development programme at the Shrewsbury Museum and Art Gallery in 2012. Curiosity is an exhibition of ambitious new art works, sited throughout the museum, which responds to the museum and heritage collections.

The exhibition includes 'the Cabinet of Curiosity', a bespoke wooden treasure trove containing interactive artworks including; sculptures, prints, mind-maps and letters/postcards. Throughout October to February, Re:Collect artists will run creative workshops, handling sessions and artists' talks.

Secret Egypt: Unravelling truth from myth

Secret Egypt challenges some of the enduring myths about ancient Egypt that are perpetuated through films, books and other popular media and invites the visitor to look at a range of archaeological evidence to re-evaluate what they understand about this remarkable civilisation.



The exhibition contains 150 objects including statuary, coffins, stelae, ceramics, jewellery and animal and human mummies. These are presented in an exciting and thought-provoking way asking six key questions that reflect modern misconceptions, and areas of controversy, around the subject of ancient Egypt. These include: Beware the mummy's curse; Were the Egyptians obsessed with death? Did aliens build the pyramids?

Secret Egypt has been produced by Birmingham Museums Trust in partnership with The Herbert Art Gallery and Museum and supported by Arts Council England.

Secret Egypt will be on display in the Special Exhibitions Gallery.

Treasure! The Discovery of the Staffordshire Hoard

The Staffordshire Hoard Mercian Trail Touring Exhibition

An exciting interactive touring exhibition that tells the fascinating story of how the Staffordshire Hoard was found and saved for the nation, will be on show on the Balcony at Shrewsbury Museum & Art Gallery.

Created by the museums team at Staffordshire County Council with the help of the Mercian Trail Partnership, this exhibition will travel to venues around the West Midlands.

Perfect for adults and children alike, it features high quality replicas of the Staffordshire Hoard, showing how it might have looked when it was first crafted, alongside hands-on interactives so you can have a go at detecting for treasure and cleaning a piece of the hoard yourself! Handling objects and try-on period costumes will also be on display to help bring the Anglo-Saxons to life.

The Harold Thomas Collection

In 1873 well before the "Scramble for Africa" began in 1881 Harold Thomas, an unknown British anthropologist, set off on a journey to the Congo. His mission was to study its people, plant and animal life. In 1873 he mysteriously disappeared. A small selection of his drawings and specimens of previously undiscovered parasitic plant species was salvaged by locals. The collection was brought back to England as property of the State.
